



We'll be working a very simple scarf, which you can make as long or short as you like! You can go short and stitch it up into a cozy cowl, or buy several skeins of yarn to make a gigantic blanket scarf!

Megan and I both knit continental style. We'll be using a long tail cast on, and a simple cast off (getting the work off of your needles!). For this pattern we will be doing a knit stitch, and a purl stitch.

> I'm personally going to cast on 33 stitches (I might change my mind!) but I want a fatter scarf.

MATERIALS:

90 + yards of super bulky yarn Size 13-17 needles (smaller will get you tighter stitches, larger will be looser)

A great yarn for inexpensive, squishy feeling projects is Wool-Ease thick and quick which is available at most craft stores:

They have stripes and solids, yarns with sparkly fibers in them. Really fun and a lot of options.
